SALNAVE. High-Handed Outrage by Salnave— War Vessels Sent to Demand Salis-

War Vossels Sent to Demand Sattsfaction.

Kingeron, Jamaica, March 28, 1869.—Serious representations have been made by Mr. St. John, the British Charge d'Affaires at Port-au Prince, to Commodore Phillimore, on this station. They are to the effect that the British steamer Cuban, for Liverpool, and carrying her Majesty's mail, was boarded by officers of the government of Salnuve, who selzed the mail bags addressed to Mr. St. John, broke the seals in spite of his remonstrances and protest and abstracted numerous private letters, and delivered over the balance to Mr. St. John. The consequence was that numerous arrests were The consequence was that numerous arrests were made, on the strength of information obtained from the letters seized, while a number of other parties were shot. Her majesty's steamer Dart brought the intelligence to this port, and her Majesty's steamer Doris, twenty-four guns, under the command of Captain Glynn, has been sent to demand from the government at Port au Prince explanations and satisfactory reparation for the insult offered to her Mojesty. In this demand Captain Glynn

her Majesty. In this demand Captain Glynn will be supported by the Jason, seventeen guns, under command of Captain Annelsly, and they are also to demand the immediate release of the British sloop Dolphin, which left this port on the 4th of February with a cargo of merchandles for Aux Cayes, and which had, by order of President Salnave, been seized.

This matter is apoken of at the naval station in Port Royal as likely to terminate seriously for Salnave, as the British authorities now see the necessity of putting an end to liberties of this sort. The Dart is about to be despatched to Berminda to communicate the facts of the case to the admiral on the station.
