A New Turnpike.—The Orlesholm Turnpike Company has just awarded a contract for macadamizing a road to extend from the Parkmont turnpike at the lower end of Chestnut Hill to the Valley Green on the Washington. The route will be from Springfield avenue or Park street. This road of the city has been a favorite drive within the past few years and has been improved by the passage of the bill which has been entirely useless for light carriages. Pleasure-seekers will now be glad to learn that it is to be put to thorough order. The contract calls for a twelve-inch macadam, to be covered with six inches of flag. The work will be commenced immediately, and will be completed, it is expected, within three months. This portion of the city abounds in magnificent scenery, and during the summer the new road will no doubt be exceedingly lively with pleasure teams of all descriptions. The officers of the Orlesholm Turnpike for this improvement, are Gen. Joshua T. Owen, President; William F. Smith, Treasurer; and Messrs. Owen, Smith, Charles McCarney, Joseph Hill, and Lewis Eckert, Directors.

Monk Louis Along the River.—The consequences of the want of sufficient light along Commerce avenue, pedestrianism along the river front at night has been exceedingly dangerous, and the Harbor Police have been kept busy in warning people of their danger. It is singular that of the docks individuals who have accidentally walked overboard. A few weeks ago Mayor Fox called the attention of City Councils to the subject, and to remedy the matter had been put up on the docks on the south side of Noble street, 2; below Callowhill, 1; below Shippen, 1; Water below Vine, 1; Water above Chestnut, 1. The lamps on Water street are located opposite alleyways, so that the light will be shed on to the docks on Delaware avenue.

MURDEROUS ASSAULT.—Henry Snubly resides in a small shanty at Cambria and Garmy streets. In the Twenty-fifth ward, a girl and several children, and dogs, dogs and chickens are all huddled together in the same structure. The place has been complained of to the police as a nuisance several times. Snubly and his wife have frequent fights, and it is said to be a matter of fact they had another quarrel, and Snubly received a frightful wound in the head. He charged his wife with having struck him with a murderous assault. Snubly was conveyed to the Episcopal Hospital, where he lies in a critical condition. He refused to prosecute his wife, and she remains at large.

A CABINET COMPANY.—A company of cabinet makers is being organized by the Northeast Boys' Grammar School, and will be attached to the Philadelphia City Guard as Company G. An entertainment, consisting of a song, choruses and dances, and a ball with dancing, was given by the pupils of the school last evening, at Core's Hall, for the benefit of the new company, and the juveniles acquitted themselves in a satisfactory manner.

LARCENY OF A WATCH.—George Jones was arrested yesterday, in the Twenty-fourth ward, upon the charge of having stolen a watch from a stable in the Twelfth ward. The timekeeper was recovered at a pawnbroker's establishment. Jones was committed by Ald. Mann.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY.—An attempt was made to rob the store of C. S. Bowers and brother, dealers in cloth and capes, No. 830 Arch street, last night. The front door was forced open, but the thieves were frightened off by the pot before they had time to secure any plunder.

MEMBERS.—William Rath and Peter Ingram, members of Reserve Corps of Police, resigned this morning. Both were appointed by Mayor Henry, the former on the 17th of March, 1889, and the latter on the 6th of October, 1881.

RECKLESS DRIVING.—Alfred Plum was arrested yesterday, at Eighth and Market streets, upon the charge of driving recklessly, in a dangerous manner. He was taken before Alderman Jones, who imposed the usual penalty.

ROBBERY.—The dwelling of Mr. Jacob Cramp, No. 608 Widley street, was entered last evening, through a back window, and was robbed of clothing valued at \$60.
