The Commencement of the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting of Friends (Orthodox branch) is to-day. The presence of Friends from a distance gave an unusual fulness to the four meetings gathered yesterday in different quarters of the city; most of these worshippers gathered in the evening to the house on Twelith street above Chestnut, the only one opened at night. The building, which holds eight hundred, was taxed much beyond its capacity, a number of the congregation eitting around it on benches in the fine evening air. Good counsel was imparted by Dr. James Thomas, of Baltimore, by his stepmother, Deborsh Thomas, of the same place, by Phebe Gifford, of New York city, and others, forming seven or eight addresses, several of which were supplicatory. "Father" Tillinghurst, a venerable long-haired patriarch from New Bedford, was present, and will attend the business sessions of the week; other dietinguished visitors, from New and Old England, will also participate.

PENNSYLVANIA PEACE SOCIETY.—This Society held a large meeting yesterday afternoon, in Friends' Meeting House, Darby, Pa. The Secretary, Lydia A. Schofield, read the constitution and letters, and addresses were made by Richel W. M. Townsend, Alfred H. Love, Aaron M. Powell, Editor of the Anti-Slavery Standard, New York, and Joseph Powell, of Darby. Great interest was manifested in the Indians, and President Grant's kind offer was approved.
