



A CURIOUS LETTER. Louis Napoleon's Own Story of His Escape from the Fortress of Ham in

The following is a translation of a hitherto unpublished letter, written by Louis Napon just after his escape from the Fortress of Ham, to the editor of a newspaper to which he had contributed during his imprisonment. In a certain poverty and awkwardness of diction it is faithful to the original, which was evidently not intended for publication:


