The State Department at Harrishurg has been searched in vain, and all that remains is a mere scrap of listory, which indicates the time when the arms of the State were engraved for the use of the Commonwealth.

The Executive Council in 1780 authorized a Mr. Penot to procure to be engraved the "arms of the State" in Paris. This Mr. Penot did and by letter from Nantes to the Council notified them that he had forwarded the engravings to be delivered to them in Philadelphia. Nothing is said of the device which was to stand for the armorial designation, called the "Arms of the Commonwealth."
