VIRGINIA—OR YELLO WOOD.—The finest specimen of this rare and beautiful tree in this latitude may now be seen in the grounds of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society. Its long pendulous racemes of odoriferous white flowers, descending as it were from a crown of pale green leaves so thin as to be almost transparent, present an object of striking beauty and interest to our readers. The Virginia is a native of the South, and was discovered by the younger Michaux in the year 1812.

UNFOUNDED.—It was stated in the BULLETIN, yesterday, that the German merchant summoned to No. 477 Broad street, to hold an inquest on the body of Mrs. Mc Cuen, who had died suddenly, and that there were rumors that death had resulted from natural causes. The husband of the deceased, who had been arrested in connection with the reports, was discharged by the coroner.

FOUND DROWNED.—An unknown white man was found drowned in the Delaware, at Port Richmond, last evening, by the Harbor Police. The deceased appeared to be about 45 years of age, and was neatly dressed in a black suit.

IMPROVEMENT TO STEAM BOILERS.—A patent has been recently granted to Mr. Thomas S. Speakman, of Camden, New Jersey, for an improvement upon steam boilers, which promises to prove most useful and valuable. It is substantially, for the purpose of burning the smoke and saving the heat usually escaping from the top of the chimneys, this being done by means of a vertical boiler, in the usual fuel employed for generating steam in boilers. This economy is the result of the following process: The heat from the fire, after acting in the boiler, is conducted by means of a fuse and other appliances into the fire-box, and again passing through the fire, consumes the smoke and saves the heat, which is usually carried, in connection with the smoke, through the fire. The necessity of reheating is thus avoided, which economizes at the rate of about fifty per centum. The improvement can be applied to boilers of all sizes, and was satisfactorily exhibited yesterday, at No. 535 Chestnut street.
