IMPROVEMENT TO STEAM BOLLERS.—A patent has been recently granted to Mr. Thomas S. Speakman, of Camden, New Jersey, for an improvement to steam boilers, sey, for an improvement to steam boilers, which promises to prove most useful and valuable. It is, substantially, for the purpose of burning the smoke and saving the heat usually escaping from the top of the chimneys, thus economizing more than fifty per cent, of the usual fuel employed for generating steam in boilers. This economy is the result of the following process: The heat from the fire, after acting on the boiler, is conducted by means of a fuse and other ampliances into the fire-hox. acting on the boiler, is conducted by means of 2 fuse and other appliances into the fire-box, and, again passing through the fire, consumes the smoke and the heat which usually escape by the ordinary chimney or flues, being thus carried, in connection with the smoke, through the fire. The necessity of reheating is thus avoided, which economizes at the rate of about fifty per centum. The improvement can be applied to boilers of all sizes, and was satisfactorily exhibited yesterday, at No. 535 Chestnut street.
