"The Council at Rome will commence on the 8th of December, the auniversary of the promulgation of the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception. What is to be done—at this period? Will it be permitted to me to express my thoughts, which I submit entirely to your wisdom and to that of the brethren assembled in Lordon? nLondon?
"Would it not be well—that—in—every place where there may be a certain number of pious and intelligent Christians this day should be devoted to conferences to which orthodox Christians of different denominations should be invited?—Would it not be well that prayers in family worship and public services, to en-treat the only Head of the Church, Jesus Christ, for the illumination and eternal salvation of those who are placed under the Papa thinkers show great boldness.
