If England now admits that it is her duty to renew her offerty from proceed the state of the state forts for a peaceful settlement, it is withou nope that our honest desire for such settlement will not be appreciated but by a small section of the American people. In the meantime, until the details of Mr. Motley's mission are known, we should fold our hands and limit our compliments to him as a great historian."

MADRID, June 5 .- Admiral Topete read Dulce's telegram, announcing his resignation as Captain-General of Cuba, before the Cortes last evening. Great excitement prevailed.
