MAN BEATEN AND SHOT.—Last evening, about half past seven o'clock, John Sharkey and James Crawford got into a fight in Martin's tavern, on Front street, above Norris street. That difficulty was arranged, apparently amicably, and the two went together to a tavern at Front street and Columbia avenue. There the quarrel seems to have been renewed, and the parties got to blows. Sharkey, it is said, bit a large piece out of the upper lip of Crawford. He then went out into the street and was met by Policeman Gillespie, who accompanied him to Front street, below Oxford, when Sharkey said that he would go home. He, however, went to a house on Howard street, below Oxford, where he sat on the front steps in company with several persons, among whom were some children. About ten o'clock, William Crawford, Constable of the Nineteenth Ward, and another man, came along, and, without saying anything, commenced beating Sharkey on the head with a black-jack. Sharkey managed to get away and ran up Howard street to the tavern of William Barker, which he entered and passed through into the yard. William Crawford, it is alleged, followed him in the yard, and, as he came, the ball taking effect in the hip. Crawford then ran away. It is claimed, on his part, that he had a warrant for the arrest of Sharkey, issued by Ald. Sims, upon the complaint of James Crawford. Sharkey was conveyed to St. Mary's Hospital, Frankford road, and Palmer street. He has three severe cuts on the head, in each of which the wound, will be a few days, but the physician would not certify that he was out of danger.

REGIMENT HEISS AND TWO OF THE TENTH DISTRICT POLICEMEN WENT TO THE HOUSE OF GEORGE CRAWFORD, ON TRENTON AVENUE, BELOW WOOD STREET, ABOUT ONE O'CLOCK THIS MORNING. CRAWFORD LOOKED OUT OF THE WINDOW AND SAID HE WOULD COME DOWN. HE GOT OUT OF A BACK WINDOW ON TO A SHED, FROM WHICH HE REACHED THE GROUND, AND THEN WENT INTO THE NEXT HOUSE, WHERE HE WAS CAPTURED. HE WAS LOCKED UP TO AWAIT A HEARING AT THE CENTRAL STATION. WILLIAM CRAWFORD SURRENDERED HIMSELF INTO THE CUSTODY OF ALDERMAN HEISS, ABOUT FOUR O'CLOCK THIS MORNING, AND WAS COMMITTED FOR A FURTHER HEARING.

STEAM FIRE YACHTS.—The business men along Delaware avenue are discussing the propriety of subscribing voluntarily to a fund for the building of one or two powerful steam yachts, to be used in times of fire, and which could be used in other ways in close proximity thereto. At the recent burning of the Patterson Block a large number of the steam fire engines drew their supply of water from the river Delaware. The scene during the height of the conflagration was one that will never be forgotten by the spectators. The incessant streams, drawn from an engine, and becoming affording by the river, were absolutely necessary to keep the fire within certain limits. It was a tremendous battle between fire and water, much of the latter being pumped and becoming sprays upon the firemen. It is not probable that such a disastrous conflagration will occur again; but extensive fires may occur at almost any time, at which steam yachts will be of the most efficient service. The subject, however, is one of deep interest, and the probability is that the desired object will be accomplished, either by private subscription or public outlay. It is possible that the project will be formally brought to the notice of the city authorities in a short time, perhaps at a special meeting. Could it be called in a few days. Shortly after the consolidation of the city the subject was partly considered by the authorities; but in the midst of other and perhaps more urgent business it was finally forgotten. Now, since the greatest fire of the period, the importance of establishing on the river front steam yachts for fire purposes has become a prominent feature, and the combined effort of the mercantile community and the constituted authorities of the city, they are likely to be added to the institutions of progressive Philadelphia.

ATLANTIC CITY.—For the information of those who wish to visit the seashore, we will inform them that the Camden and Atlantic Railroad are now running five trains daily to the City by the Sea. One at 8:00 and at 9:45 A. M., and at 3:15 P. M. In addition to these, two fast trains (through in one hour and three-quarters) are now running, leaving Vine Street wharf at 2:00 and 3:15 P. M. The Sunday train will be run as usual, leaving Vine Street wharf at 8 A. M. Returning, leaves Atlantic at 4 P. M.

LONG BRANCH.—Passengers are now enabled to reach this watering place in only four hours. There are two trains run daily, one at 8 A. M., and one at 2 P. M., both from Walnut street wharf. The fare is \$3, or an excursion ticket for the round trip, \$4.
