MODERN ENGLISH FOREIGN POLICY. The riches of the English neople constitute of course, an element of the power of the Eng lish government. But these riches have, recent times, become an important agent in the meservation of peace among other powers. British capital, overflowing the limits of the United Kingdom and the capacities for investment in home enterprises, has been engaged in works in all parts of the world, and loaned to country. The profit of such investments de

pends on the prosperity of each and all of these ountries, and their prosperity depends monthe preservation of peace among all nations. Hence, whenever there is an international difficulty abroad, the effect is felt in ""the city" in London ! Lombard street is brought to bear upon Downing street, and all the influnce of England is employed to smooth over he difficulty or to reconcile the disputants. In the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries there was a different state of affairs. Then the policy of England was a predatory policy,

which either undertook works of conquest to enrich the nation, its chartered companies and its citizens, or promoted quarrels among petty or semi-barbarous States, in the midst of which England or the English could step in and carry off a large portion of the spoils. In those mes, the colonies of Great Britain were regarded, first as fields of speculation for the rich subjects at home, and then as sources of revenue for the home government, just as Cuba is now regarded by Spain. The success ful resistance of the people of this country to such taxation produced a change in English policy, and the colonies of the subsequent period have been liberally treated. The home overnment, in fact, derives no revenue from Canada. Australia or the other provinces. 


