With two large rivers flowing at our doors, so meagre is the supply of water that it has been found necessary to suspend a large portion of the manufacturing operations of the city, while it is only by the closest economy that enough water can be secured for domestic purposes. This state of affairs has brought the whole community to a clear agreement in reference

to the absolute necessity of providing an auxiliary steam engine for the Fairmount works. During ten months in the year the turbine pumps are all-sufficient for all the wants of the city, and the turbine system is unquestionably the cheapest and best power which can be used when there is plenty of water. But the turbine wheel requires from eight to ten gallons of water to raise one gallon to the Fairmount reservoirs and, in such a season as the present, this amount of water-power cannot be spared.
