The following despatch from the Hon, Wm. E.Dodge, of the Indian Commission, has been received in this city: CAMP SUPPLY, Indian Territory, August 21st, 1800.-George II. Stuart, Philadelphia:

We have to-day had a most important meeting with the Cheyennes and Arrapahoes. A large number of Chiefs were present, and fully 2.000 men, women and children on ponies ontside. Medicine Arrow for the Chevennes and Little Room for the Arrapahoes made excellent peace speeches. The council lasted wo hours, and its results are considered most favorable for our objects. It was a most imposing and interesting sight. We are now two thousand miles from home, living in tents. We start to-morrow for Medicine Bluff, Witchaw Mountains, some 200 miles south ; from there we turn east, passing through the entire Indian reservation, and hope to reach home in 30 or 40 days hence. The Indians have killed 700 buffaloes the past week within ten miles of this place. WM. E. DODGE.

MONDAY, Aug. 23 .- The past week closed on an active and close money market, and judging by appearances his morning, the same features are likely to control the operations of the present week, or at least is portion of it. There is a steady demand for capital, chicdly for local business purposes, a large portion of which is met at the outside sources and at outside rates. Much of this activity is induced by the fears of the future and the desire to anti-cipate possible events, rather than by the present catter cipate possible events, rather than by the present actual

requirements of business. This accounts, in a great-measure, for the unusual amount of commercial paper of sixty and ninety days now affoat, and the exacting rates demanded for such loans. We quote on call at 7, per cent., and discounts range, widely from 8a12, with very little business done, however, under 10 per cent. 




