The Bombardment of the City of Gon-nives by the Rebels.

Port au Prince, August 12, 1869.—The unbarded by land and sea. This city has been under an active siege by the Cacos for the past fourteen months, the rebels being now in posfourteen months, the rebels being now in possession of two steamers, supposed to be formerly the American steamships Quaker
City and Delphine. They are bombarding
the place by sea with their two steamers,

day the British steamer Britomart arrived at

firing and offered to the commander and garrison of the town: twenty-four hours to embark themselves by said steamer and abandon
the town, which was peremptorily refused by
General Victoria Chevalier, the general commanding, but he asked at the same time three
hours' grace to ship off all women and chilmanding, but he asked at the same time three hours' grace to ship off all women and children left there, which was accorded. The same were immediately embarked on board the Britomart, which landed them here. The bombardment was then resumed, the authorities being determined to fight it out to the last. (It should be understood that said town of Gonaives is for Salneya and carrisoned by his officers and Salnave, and garrisoned by his officers and soldiers.) It is expected that a general attack will take place by land and sea to-day, the land now tighting for his life, and that unfortunate town must become the scene, if taken, of much bloodshed and carnage. The place itself will be laid in ashes before surrendering.
