VIRGINIA AND THE ATTORNEY GENERAL. Attorney-General Hoar's opinion upon Ge eral Canby's theory that the test oath should be taken by the newly elected members of the Virginia Legislature, relieves the situation of its embarassment if it does not furnish a solution of the difficulty which will be satisfactory to all loyal men. We explained, a few days ago, that number of persons who, under the reconstruc tion/laws, were ineligible, were neverthele elected to the Virginia Legislature simultaneonsly with the adoption of a Constitution which removes their disabilities. This Constitution is, of course, of no effect until it is accepted by Congress, and so these disqualified men are unable to participate in legislative business until Congress can act upon the instrument, unless they can take the test oath. This is General Canby's position; and it is manifestly correct. But, in the meantime, it is necessary that the Legislature should meet and ratify the Constitutional Amendment, for such ratification is an essential condition of the admission of the State to the Union, and to the acceptance of

There would have been no obstacle then to immediate reconstruction. Attorney-General Hoar, however, proposes to overcome the difficulty in this way. He thinks that the Legislature may meet now, organize. and act upon the Fifteenth Amendment without doing any other thing, or assuming the power to transact any regular business. When his is done, it will have to wait for Congressional approval before it can proceed to a full exercise of its functions. This seems to us : rather singular way of settling the matter, for if


