Lord Palmerston's Diary.

The London Athenaum says:

"Hord Palmerston's diary is written in a hand only a little less firm and graceful than walfole's but is quite as legible. It is not a mere record of facts, but a gallery of pictures and sketches, in all of which are clearly to be seen the style of an accomplished master. It is, besides, something more. Queer Movement in Russia.

The proposed Ecumenical Council has produced a curious movement among the Russian clergy. They propose to get up a counter demonstration to that preparing at Rome by having another council at St. Petersburg, attended by bishops of the Greek Church, and presided over by the Emperor. It is said that the Pope has made great efforts to induce the Government at St. Petersburg to send Russian bishops to Rome, but without success. Upon this the "Orthodox" clergy came forward, with their plan for the Government holding a council of its own, but they were informed in reply that this could not be done, as it would offend the Roman Catholics in the empire. WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—GENERAL ORDER.—The death of General John A. Rawlins, Secretary of War, which occurred on Monday, Sept. 6, 1869, is hereby announced to the Navy and Marine Corps. He will be buried with military honors at 10 A. M. on September 9. Orders for closing the Department and draping it in mourning, and for the attendance of officers at the funeral, have been issued. As an additional mark of respect for the very distinguished soldier and statesman who has just died in the service of his country, the flag will be From Washington. in the service of his country, the flag will be displayed at half-mast from sunrise to sunset, and fifteen minute guns be fired at noon on and fifteen minute guns be fired at noon on September 9th, or on the day after the receipt of this order by mail or telegram, at all the navy yards and stations, and on the vessels of war of the United States in commission, and at the Naval Academy. Crape will be worn by the Secretary and by the officers of the navy and marine corps on the left arm for thirty days.
