ROBBING THE MAILS.—Richard J. Schroener, a mail agent connected with the United States Postal Department, who has charge of letter packages, &c., between this city and New York, was arrested yesterday at Burlington, N. J., on the charge of abstracting the contents of boxes, letters, &c., intrusted to his charge. Complaints were made about the loss of articles, and detectives were set to work. Yesterday, as the train stopped at Burlington, Schroener was caught in the act of opening a letter. The track for some distance was found to be strewn with envelopes, which had been broken open. On the person of Schroener was found a quantity of jewelry, gold leaf, money, bonds and other articles, abstracted from packages and letters. The punishment for offense of this description is imprisonment for a term of not less than ten nor more than twenty years.

THE PRISONER IS IN JAIL AT BURLINGTON. New Military Organization.—Company A, Frankford Fire Zouaves, an organization but four weeks in existence, has been mustered into service by Captain Stewart, second regiment, Philadelphia Fire Zouaves. The following is a list of officers: Wm. B. Stokes, Captain; John Stovman, First Lieutenant; A. G. Swope, Second Lieutenant. The company at present musters 60 effective members, uniformed, and it is constantly receiving applications for membership. Captain Stokes intends to organize a battalion.

HOUSE ROBBERY.—The dwelling of Wm. S. Roberts, No. 216 Ellsworth street, was entered yesterday by prying open the cellar door and knocking a panel out of the door opening into the upper part of the house. Clothing valued at \$125 was stolen. The family were absent, looking at the parade of the American Protestant Association, at the time of the robbery.

ALLEGED PICKPOCKET.—William Hogan was arrested last evening at Nineteenth and Chestnut streets, upon the charge of having picked the pocket of a lady. The pocket-book stolen was found on his person. The accused will have a hearing at the Central Station this afternoon.

SPRAY ANIMALS.—During the past two weeks 150 unbranded dogs were captured in the city. Of that number 83 were redeemed and 117 were killed. One horse and 44 goats were found astray, and were sold according to law.
