THE ELECTION CANVASSES.—The Division Carrassers appointed by the Board of Aldermen are o meet fa their respective election divisions on Saturday meet, for the purpose of placing on the registry lists, the sames of such qualified voters as have been omitted from the american lists. There seems to be an impression that the canyassers are to act as a port of assessors, to place names on the assessment lists. This is a mistake. Section 20 of the Registry Law provides that no extra assessment shall be made after the 20th of September in any year. The canvassers are to place on their lists only the names of persons who have resided within the State one year, and in the election division ten days, and have paid a supplementation of the contract of the State or county tax within two years, and whose names have been omitted from the namessors' lists. All names amost be placed on the canvassers' list on Saturday. The session of Monday is for the purpose of revising the lists, and striking off the names of persons who have re-moved from the divisions, or who may have been im-properly assessed. Qualified votors, whose names are not on the assessment lists, should therefore be particu-lar to attend the meeting of the canvassers on Saturday, and should take a voucher and their tax receipts with

NEW FREIGHT DEPOT .- The Philadelphia. Germantown and Norristown Railroad Company ha now in course of erection a substantial new freight de not at the southwest corner of Ninth and Green streets, to take the place of the old structure which was destroyed by fire. The new hullding occupies a space of Mestroyed of net. The new thinding occupies a space of 250 feet on Minth street by 145 feet along the line of Green street. The foundation is of granito, and the building is of fine pressed brick, with granito facings to the windows. The principal entrance for locomotives will be at the corner of Minth and Green streets, and a ventilator of new design will be placed there. To the westward there will be another large door, and there will also be door ways on Depot street for the entrance of freight to be shipped. The depot will be about 30 feet in height, and the main body is to be austained by four massive iron columns. It is to be covered with what is termed the suspersion roof." and will have the lantern light on cop, to aid ventilation. On the Green street front there will be two offices for the accommodation of the agents and others connected with the Company's freight de-

partment.
The work on the building is progressing rapidly, and, it is expected, will be completed by the 1st of December. When finished the edifice will not only be a great accommodation to the Company and its patrons, but will be a handsome ornament to that section of the city.
