THE ELECTION-CANVASSERS.—The Division of Assessors appointed by the Board of Aldermen are to meet in their respective election divisions on Saturday next, for the purpose of placing on the registry lists the names of such qualified voters as have been omitted from the assessment lists. NEW FREIGHT DEPOT.—The Philadelphia, Germantown and Norristown Railroad Company has in course of erection a substantial new freight depot at the southeast corner of Ninth and Green streets, to take the place of the old structure which was destroyed by fire. The new building occupies a lot 40 feet on Ninth street by 146 feet along the line of Green street. The foundation is of granite, and the building is of the pressed brick, with granite facing to the windows. The principal entrance for locomotives is at the corner of Ninth and Green streets, and a ventilator of new design will be placed there. To the westward there will be another large door, and there will also be a door on the depot street for the entrance of freight to be shipped. The depot will be about 50 feet in height, and the main body is to be sustained by four massive iron columns. It is to be covered with what is termed the suspension roof. The building is to be finished on the top, to ventilation. On the Green street front there will be two offices for the accommodation of the agents and others connected with the Company's freight department.

THE FURNACE OF JOHN DORRANCE.—The furnace of John Dorrance will be placed on the corner of Chestnut and Arch streets, on Saturday afternoon, from St. James Church, Bristol, Pa. It will be attended by a large number of his personal friends living in that locality, and also by the Directors of the American and Philadelphia Railroad Companies, Trenton Railroad Companies, together with a large delegation of the mercantile community from the Commercial Exchange. The latter gentlemen proceeded to Bristol from West Philadelphia, by a special train, at 9 o'clock this afternoon.

FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—An unknown white man, aged about forty-five years, was run over by a train of cars on the Baltimore Railroad, at Gibson's Point, and was killed. The man was about five feet eight inches high, had dark hair, moustache, and large whiskers, and was dressed in a dark cloth sack coat, vest and pants, figured calico shirt and long boots. Papers found on his person contained the name "M. Wilson." The coroner took charge of the body.
