A WRITER in the Church Journal asserts tha Bishop McIlvaine, of Ohio, is becoming more and more conservative, and ventures the pre-diction that he will make the "tallest High Churchman in the land." The writer say that, three years ago, "feeling no appetite for the extempore prayer meetings which immediately preceded the daily sessions of the Diocesan Conventions, he moved in open session, that when this convention meets to morrow morning for prayers, we have the regular prayers set forth in the Book of Common Prayer But the Bishop refused to hear the motion directions were given, in anticipation of the sessions of the convention, that 'there must be no extempore prayer meetings." From the minutes of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church we learn that 1 churches gave over \$10,000 for benevolent pur poses, exclusive of congregational expenses. The First Church, New York, gave the largest contribution, being \$132,000. To these are to be added 15 whose/gifts exceed \$5,000. Among the latter we find the Philadelphia Central, Spring Garden and West Spruce Street and Germantown (First) Churches, and among the former the Tenth Presbyterian Church
