PENDLETON DEFEATED 1 OHIO.

The Republicans of Philadelphia ha reason to congratulate themselves on a rious victory yesterday. With a fair election conducted under the new Registry law, an tolerably good turn out of voters, the Repu con candidates succeeded by majorities rangi from 2,800 to 5,000.

If the rest of the State had done equa well, Geary's majority would have reach twenty thousand; but owing to local cause in Allegheny and other counties, we have I considerably. At the same time, we ha gained handsomely in Luzerne, York and few other counties, and we judge that Gear majority will be between 5,000 and 8,000, wh

Williams's will be a couple of thousand large Both branches of the State Legislature w be Republican, the majority on joint bal probably being 29. This prevents the repe of the resolution adopting the Fifteen Amendment, for which the Packer Democra has been fondly hoping.

The returns from Ohio are meagre, and t voting appears to be close. But the Repu licans claim the election of Hayes by a su cient majority over Pendleton.
