

Andian Outrages Avenged.-The Iowa Election. CHICAGO, Oct. 20.—An Omaha despatch to the Tribune says a réport was received at De-partment headquarters from Colonel Dun-can, who recently commanded the expedition on the Republican river, that there is no further doubt that the surveying party of 12 inen under Nelson Buck were murdered by Indians on the Republican river, the latter part of August or early in September. The following is just received from Santa F6: A letter from Apache Pass, dated Oct. 9, reports that about sixty Apaches, led by a chief named Cachuz, attacked a mail coach on the 5th, killing the driver, Colonel Stone and four soldiers of the Twenty-dirst Infantry, acting as an escort. They left the bodies of the murdered men naked and horribly muti-lated, and carried off the coach and mules. They also captured three hundred cattle, owned by a man named Scott, in the neigh-borhood.




