THE TWENTY-SEVENTH WARD.—Last night, about half-past eleven o'clock, a fire broke out in the Union Star Mills, located at Ferry-fourth street, between the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth wards.

The flames originated in the picker-room, which is 50 by 48 feet, and located in the second-story of the southern portion of the mill. The fire burned rapidly, and spread through the southern portion of the building, badly damaging the machinery and destroying most of the stock which was on the three floors.

The iron doors prevented the fire from spreading to the eastern portion of the mill. The loss of Mr. Greenwood is estimated at \$15,000. The buildings, stock, machinery, &c., are insured for \$4,000, the insurance being divided among the Mutual, Delaware, Mutual Merchants', Hartford, and Security of New York.

Operations will be resumed in the remaining portion of the mill in a few days.
