On that day he bodies of a woman named Madame Kinck and her five children, all horribly mutilated, were found by a peasant in a field belonging to a man named Langlois, near the railway station of Pantin, a few miles north of the French metropelis. A few days afterwards the body of Gustave, the oldest son of Madame Kinck. was found near the same place, and it is be-Leved that Jean Kinck, the husband and father f these victims, has also been murdered: though, as his body has not been found, this is net proved. But supposing him to have been butchered like the rest, the number amounts to eight, and coincides with the number slain by Probst. A man named Jean Baptiste Troppmann has been arrested for these murders, and there is little doubt of his guilt.
