thousands of members of the Order in Phila-delphia do not favor the project.

All that is required is a little energy, and the asylum will speedily become one of the fixed institutions of Pennsylvania. Incorporated with it will be schools wherein to educate the orphans in accordance with the cardinal principles of the fraternity.

But worse than this. Last winter the weather became intensely Last winter the weather became intensely cold just before Christmas; hundreds of coopedup chickens were subjected to its severity in the open streets and market places, and, of course, frozen nearly to death before being removed to places of shelter. Now that the cold weather will soon set in, a few words from the S. P. C. A. would prevent thoughtless dealers permitting their live chickens to remain conned in small boxes on the sidewalks main cooped in small boxes on the sidewalks

of our streets.
