MEETING OF THE COMMERCIAL EXCHANGE ASSOCIATION The members of the Commercial Exchange Association assembled this morning at the store of Messrs. J. II.
Michener & Co., on Arch sireet, below Second, to adopt measures in reference to their future transaction of business. There was quite a large attendance.

Mr. J. H. Michener, the President of the Association,

called the meeting to order, and said that the members met under different circumstances from which they had ever assembled before, as the Commercial Exchange Association appears to be without an abiding-place, in consequence of the destruction of the building last evening. He had called the members together to take into consideration the erection of a new take into consideration the erection of a new building, or to take measures for future meetings. When he found that there was a total destruction of their meeting room he tendered the Association the use of a room until other arrangements could be made. He understood from Mr. Hinchman, the President of the Chamber of Commerce, that an early meeting of the Board of Directors will be held, with a view to the immediate erection of the building. A Committee of the Board of Brokers is now here to tender the use of their building until other arrangements are made. He held in his hands a note from the Tobacco Trade, tendering

the use of their rooms.

Mr. Howard Hinchman, President of the Chamber of serce, then stated that the Board of Directors had been called together to take into consideration the im-mediate rebuilding of the structure. He was satisfied that the insurance will more than cover the loss, and in less than a year, a building equal, if not superior, to the

late one, will be reared. [Applause.] Mr. Slaymaker, of the Board of Brokers, was then introduced and said that he, in connection with Messrs.

Bayard and Bingham, had been appointed by a Committee to tender the sympathies of that body to the Com-mercial Exchange Association, and to offer to them the use of their room in the building, No. 421 Walnut street, until such time as they can make permanent arrange

ments for better accommodations. Mr. E. Harper Jeffries moved that the offer be accopted, and that the thanks of the Commercial Exchange Association be returned to the Board of Brokers. Mr. S. J. Christian moved to amend-that the thanks of this Association be returned to the Board of Brokers and the Tobacco Trade for their kind offers, and that a

STATEMENT OF AN EYE-WITNESS. We have received from Solomon W. Roberts, Esq., the following statement concerning the beginning of the con-

following statement conterning the beganing of the configuration:

"At twelve minutes before five o'clock last evening I went into the building of the Commercial Exchange, and it was then nearly dark in the lower hall. I passed up the curved stairway to the right, and went into the first office near the head of the stairs, on the south side of the building. The door of this office was opposite to the rotunds, and I left the door open. At this time no signs of fire appeared. I had been in the office about six minutes when I heard loud noises in rapid succession which sounded as if two persons were firing revolvers in the large hall of the second story. There appeared to me to he a series of small explosions. In about a minute I saw through the open doer a shower of fire and of broken glass, which appeared to be falling from the skylight of the dome. On reaching the street I saw flames bursting through the roof, and a few minutes after the first alarm I felt sure that no efforts could save the combustible parts of the building.

"WHOLESALE, LIGUAR DEAL.

DRUGGISTS AS WHOLESALE LIQUOR DEAL-ERS.—The members of the Drug Exchange held an adjourned meeting this afternoon, at their room, No. 17 South Third street, to take action in reference to the decision of Commissioner Douglass, of the Interna Revenue Department, that wholesale druggists who deal in spirits must take out licenses as wholesale liquor dealers. Mr. Gulager, Vice President, was in

the chair.
Messrs. Miller, Hunce, Landis, Malcolni and Wilson, who had been appointed at a previous meeting a com-mittee to consider the subject, made a report, containing the following potition to Congress, asking such additional legislation on the act entitled "An act imposing taxes or

distilled spirits and tobacco, '&c., as shall relieve them from the odium of being classed as "wholesale or retail from the outlin of being passed in the state of Representatives.

To the Hongroble Senate and House of Representatives.

The undersigned, druggists and chemists, dealers in varnishes and hatters' supplies, and others interested in the use of alcohol for the arts and sciences, respectfully

varnishes and hatters supplies and others interested in the use of alcohol for the arts and sciences, respectfully present:

That our business is seriously unpaired by the annoyances and delay attendant upon the details of gauging, inspecting and stamping small packages of alcohol, and that our self respect is outraged by being compelled to display signs as "Wholesale Liquor Bealers," which signs bear falsehood and calmony upon their face, as the selling of alcohol alone cannot be construed into "liquor dealing." Alcohol is not a beverace and has not hezerfore been regarded as a "wine or liquor" in the meaning of the law. The Hon. E. A. Rollins, late Commissioner of Internal Revenue, under date of August 22, 193, ruled that "spothecaries incurred no liability to special tax by reason of the sales of alcohol." Acting Commissioner Denglass, on the 20th September, 1893, raversed this ruling, deciding that druggless and all others selling alcohol must be regarded as "Luquor Dealers," and in all respects amenable to the law governing such dealers. Therefore, your petitioners pray, that inasmuch as we do not believe the law was thus intended to distress the business interests of the class we represent that you will at an early day so amend or define this act as to give us rehef from the grievances of which we complain. And your petitioners will ever pray, de., &c.
