Proposition from President Grant for an International Cable Convention-Interesting Letter from Secretary Fish Setting Forth His Views. The following communication from Secre-tary Fish, addressed to our ministers and diplomatic agents in foreign countries, will l read with interest, as embodying the views President Grant on the subject of intern President Grant on the subject of interna-tional cables. The proposition of the Presi-dent for a convention of all the Powers inter-ested in the subject is one that will commend itself as containing the practical solution of a question which threatens a deluge of diplo-matic correspondence: DEFARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, Nov. 18, 1669.—Sir:—The President thinks the present moment favorable for the negotiation of a joint convention by the maritime Powers who endeavor to keep out of our way, and who wish in no respect to have anything to do with the war."
