THE PHILADELPHIA LIBRARY.—The Philadelphia Library Company has purchased a new building in accordance with the purpose which has long been entertained of removing the Library to a more western location.

The lot purchased is on the northwest corner of Locust and Juniper streets, opposite to the Episcopal Academy, measuring 110 feet on the Locust street front, with a depth of 240 feet on Juniper street, including the properties of the Rutherford and Livezey estates.

It is not the intention of the Library Company to erect the new building immediately. The Building Fund does not yet warrant the commencement of building operations, nor is it likely that they will be begun until the Company has some immediate prospect of selling the old property.
