FIRE AT A HOTEL.—This morning about two o'clock a fire broke out in the National Hotel building (formerly White Swan) Nos. 306, 308 and 310 Race street. The flames originated in the fourth-story of the rear por-tion, in a room occupied by A. Block as a window-shade manufactory. The contents of this room were entirely destroyed, and the flames extended to some of the adjoining rooms before they were extinguished. Mr. Block estimates his loss at \$1,600, upon which there is no insurance. The hotel is occupied by Messrs. Rahn &

Co., and has recently been fitted up with new furniture, &c., at an expense of about \$8,500. The entire building was drenched with water, and the loss of Messrs. Rahn & Co. is esti-inated at \$6,500. The firm has an insurance of 55,000 in the Fire Association and \$2,500 in the Royal Insurance Company. of London. The building belongs to C. C. Roberts, of New York, and is damaged to the extent of \$1,500. Insured in the Hand-in-Hand.




