FAST DRIVING.—Chas. C. Hague was arrested yesterday, at Tenth and Thompson streets, upon the charge of reckless driving. Ald. Hood held him in \$1000 bail for his appearance at court.

SNEAK THIEF.—Charles Lewis, a colored individual, sneaked into a house, No. 625 Lombard street, last evening, and stole possession of a coat. He was arrested, and Alderman Carpenter held him in \$800 bail for trial.

CANAL BOAT ROBBED.—The canal boat R. W. McClelland, lying at Greenwich Point, was robbed of an anchor and some canvass, rope, &c., about 3 o'clock this morning.

ANOTHER.—The Sixth District Police found a dead baby at Twelfth and Cherry streets last night. This is the fifth baby which has been found in that district during this week.
