Shooting Affair.

BROOKLYN, Feb. 14.—This city was startled last evening by a report that Dominick S. Voorhees, a prominent builder, ex-member of the Board of Supervisors, and a candidate for the Mayorship, had been brutally murdered in a saloon at the corner of Columbus and Carroll streets. It seems that Voorhees, who was not a drinking man, visited the saloon upon some business matter, when an individual with whom he was not acquainted, named Chambers, entered the place, and after a drink of whiskey, drew a pistol, and without the slightest provocation, shot Voorhees through the head. The bullet entered the left eye, penetrated to the brain, and lodged there. This morning Mr. Voorhees is reported to be in a dying condition. Chambers has been arrested. He says he was intoxicated, and does not recollect anything of the affair.

Shot from his Injuries.

Mr. Voorhees, who was shot by Chambers here last night, lingered in great agony until 1 o'clock this morning, when he expired. The affair causes a great deal of excitement, especially in political circles. Voorhees, the murdered man, had an insurance upon his life of \$50,000. He failed to pay the premium, and his liabilities footing up in the sum of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars. New York, Feb. 14.—The U. S.
