WHO IS MAYOR OF QUEBEC?

A Second Richmond in the Field....The City Hall Besieged...."Starvation, Isola-tion and Armed Demonstration" and their Consequences, [From the Quebec Morcury, May 4.] The City Hall, virtually in a state of siege since yesterday forenoon, is now in possession of Mr. Garneau and the gentlemen who have elected him Mayor. Yesterday, while Mr. Tourangeau, who has the opinion of counsel to he effect that he remains legally the Mayor of Quebec, was in the City Hall, a meeting of the Police Board was convened. The law says the Mayor of the city shall be the Chairman of that Board, and Mr. Garneau presided as such at a meeting where, by his vote and that of the Judge of the Sessions, the Recorder dissenting, he Police were directed to obey the legal orders of Mr. Garneau. Acting on Mr. Gar-neau's instructions, the Police, hitherto inside he City Hall, came outside of it, and guarded all means of access and approach. Mr. Tourangeau was in the Oity Hall while this change in the command of the Pollce took place, and he suddenly found himself trans-ferred from the position of a commander to that of a prisoner. The Police, previously in-side the building, now encompassed it and pre-vented and isolated all who were in it from com-munication with the outer world. 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
