The intention is to run them in connection with all the trains arriving in the city. The agent of the Transfer Company on the train, while making arrangements for the conveyance of baggage to hotels, depots, &c., will at the same time sell a ticket for a coupe, at one dollar, or 50 cents for each passenger. That will be the rate of fare for any distance within two miles. Upon application at the offices of the company, Nos. 828 and 901 Chestant street, a carriage will be sent to the house of any person desiring to go to a railroad depot. Mr. Schenck, from the Committee on Ways and Means, reported a bill amending and reducing the Internal Revenue. He made, a brief speech explaining the provisions of the It exempts incomes under fifteen hundred

dollars, but retains five per cent. rate. It adds tax three and a half per cent. on deposits of public money, abolishes the stamp tax on agreements, &c.
The total reduction proposed is thirty-three million six hundred and sixty thousand dol-

lars.
The bill contains about fifty pages.
Mr. Schenck moved that the bill be printed and recommitted, with authority to bring it back at any time, to be considered by sections, under the five-minute rule... He hoped to be Mr. Dawes appealed to Mr. Scheuck not to press this bill or the Tariff bill until Appro-

priation bills were disposed of.

Of nine appropriation bills, but one has yet become a law.

In six weeks the fiscal year closes, and the Government will then be without a dollar. A deficiency of one and a half millions this day exists in the department for the collection of existens, and that important branch of service must soon stop unless an appropriation be

made.
After further debate Schenck's motion was adopted.
Mr. Schenck said in order to facilitate busi-

ness in connection with the tariff, he would further move that when the House shall hereafter te in Committee of the Whole on nercatter tean Committee of the Whole on the Tariff bill, it may cause any section or por-tion to be read for amendment, and may then close the delate thereon within a time indi-cated. cated.

In reply to a question, Mr. Schenck said he did not suppose the Tariff bill would be passed so as to become a law at this session of Congress. He desired to get it through the House. His expectation was that it would be taken up in the Senate next December, and would there be amended, and would finally pass both Houses before the fourth of March next.

Considerable opposition was made to Schenck's motion. It was argued that it would enable him to arbitrarily close debate

on the entire bill.

Mr. Schenck denied any purpose of closing debate or shutting off amendment.

His motion to suspend the rules and pass the resolution was not agreed to—yeas 103, to mays 50—two-thirds not voting in the affirma on the entire bill.
