THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD. | said that his remorse was terrible after the Becollections of Ninvery—Columbia the Rendezvous of the Fagitty -- Some No-inble Incidents of the Sifuggle for Pritatom.
The Lancaster Intelligence has the followng very interesting article: Columbia, of all the towns in Pennsylvania was for sixty years the most noted rendezvous or manumitted and fugitive slaves. The set tlement was made principally by Quakers, who have always been the friends of the oppressed nd down-trodden, to whom they were eve ready to offer shelter and an asylum. When William Wright (the grandson of John Wright, founder of Wright's Ferry) attained his ma-jority, he at once interested himself in behalf f the enslaved. His first public act for them caused considerable excitement amongst the slaveholders. About 60 years ago Chas. Sewell a wealthy slaveholder, removed from Bush River Neck, in Harford county, Maryland to the Mauor in this county, bringing with him-nine slaves (one of whom was Sam. Craig, who lived afterwards with Mrs. Evans, in Donegal.) He kept blooded stock and a puc f hounds, after a manner of his kind. W of these slaves, and succeeded in getting them rec. As he was leaving Laucaster, after th rial, Sewell started in pursuit to chastise him; both had blooded horses and were good riders They were but a few yards apart both forcing their animals at the height of their speed. Be tween Lancaster and Klugh's tavern, the former to effect his escape by locking himself in a room. Sewell was a powerful man, while courage enough, and nerve to face any dan-ger in behalf of outraged humanity. His fame of Maryland and Virginia, and from that time with them. When the fact became known to Wm. Wright he never failed to attempt to obtain their freedom through the Courts. I 1816 Izard Bacon, a wealthy land and slave ger, a nephew of Bacon, gathered these liftysix slaves together—of all ages—in wagons, and drove them to Columbia. For several days and perhaps weeks, they were quartered n the large stone warehouse of Bethels. where the canal basin now is, and where Evan Green had his lumber-yard. The Pleasants. Raynolds, and Greens were of this numer. A few years later upwards of a hundred county, Virginia, adjoining Hearico county. at the Lamb tavern on Locust street. These slaves belonged to Sallie Bell, a Quaker lady. The Sawneys were of this party. A few years ater—another—large—party—came: Fugitive slaves were constantly seeking refuge amongst their friends here, and tive slaves were their number was quite large. It got to be whenever a slave ran away from his master in Maryland or Virginia, he sought his capture here. They even paid a worthless vagabond, named Eaton, several and dred dollars per annum to remain here and give nformation of fugitive slaves. Charles Taylor. a stage-driver, was another slave informer. nurse, and earned money enough in a few years to purchase her freedom and that of a sister, whom she met there and had not seen for thirty years. She married a wealthy Creole. A few years ago she visited her friends in Columbia. About this time a slave-catcher of York, named Isaac Brooks. was taken by the colored people to Hinkle's Meadow, when the snow was several inches deep, and whipped by them most terribly. A colored man was arrested about this time, haudcusted by his master, but before he got to Shawnee Run his carriage was surrounded and the slave rescued. James Blake, a fugitive slave, was killed at the Point Rock about thirty-three years ago:

After the passage of the Fugitive Slave law in 1850, a Mrs. Numan and her children were taken on Fifth street. A Mrs. Cobb and family, from H. Suydam's, while washing. William Baker was the first fugitive slave taken by force, and remanded back to slavery after the passage of that law. He was sawing wood at Shemberger's, on Locust street, when number of leading citizens of Columbia ad vanced the money and purchased his freedom pefore his master took him from Philadelphia. In May, 1852, Archibald G. Ridgely, a slave catcher of Baltimore, shot Wm. Smith while attempting to take him out of a lumber yard at Brown's Hotel. He was the first martyr under the Fugitive Slave Law. It was a cold-

A mob committed mayhem upon the colored man and tied him to the knob of Goheen's door, where he was found nearly dead.
