MEDICAL SOCIETY OF THE STATE OF PENNSYLVANIA.

Second Day. Morning Session.—The Society met at 10 o'clock this morning, and was called to order by the President, after calling over the list of delegates...

Dr. Steller moved that Article Eleventh of the Old Constitution be added to the New Constitution. Carried.

Prof. Gross offered an amendment to the Constitution providing that the members of the College of Physicians shall be entitled to seats in this Society on the same footing as members of the Philadelphia County Medical Society...

Dr. Gross offered a resolution relative to giving entertainments, &c., are burdensome upon the physicians of the place where the meetings are held...

Dr. Stiles, of the New York State Society, was then introduced and made a short address. Dr. Samuel Sully, of New Jersey, was next introduced...

Dr. Washington L. Alee, of Philadelphia, presented an appeal to the Convention in behalf of women physicians and women colleges...

In pursuance of the above, Dr. Alee offered the following preamble and resolutions: That the action of the Medical Society of the State of Pennsylvania towards the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania originated in consequence of a series of irregular organizations...

Dr. Neuberger opposed the passage of the resolution, because he believed that the passage of such a law would popularize patent medicines and defeat the object of the passage of the resolution...

Dr. Neuberger claimed that the makers of patent medicines are constructing a monopoly by the use of their medicines, and thus evade the law. The order of the day, as fixed for 12 o'clock, was then taken up...

In State of Pennsylvania, respectively appeals to it on a subject often discussed at previous sessions, viz: The Status of Medical Practice. It is now settled as a fact that there are, as physicians, and women's medical colleges exist, among us by right of law...

This College, therefore, being organized on the same foundation as the best institutions in our country, hospital arrangements being superior to most of our medical schools, and carrying a distinguished medical and surgical corps, let us now see the attitude of the State Society still maintained towards the Women's Medical College...

Article 21 of our Constitution says: "The objects of this Society shall be the advancement of medical knowledge, the protection of the interests of its members; the extension of the bounds of medical science, and the promotion of all measures adapted to the relief of suffering..."

Query.—Do not the State Society and the Philadelphia County Medical Society annual consultations in Philadelphia, in the spirit and spirit of their constitutions, by opposing the Women's Medical College, as at present constituted?

In regard to the qualifications of those admitted to the medical profession, I say: "No one shall be admitted as a member of a county society unless he is either a graduate in medicine of some respectable medical school, or has a license to practice from some State or Territory recognized by the State Society..."

Query.—What is meant by a "regular practitioner?" Article 1, section 1, of our code of ethics answers: "No one can be a regular practitioner or a fit associate in consultation whose practice is based on an exclusive dogma, to the rejection of the accumulated experience of the profession..."
