1. Several years ago the Philadelphia County Medical Society passed a resolution forbidding consultations with the professors and graduates of the Female Medical College of Pennsylvania. The Board of Censors of the County Society approved its action, and its chairman carried the resolution to the State Society, at the deventh appears of the grain where he again carried the resolution to the State Society, where he again acted as chairman of a committee of five, who, reporting favorably upon the resolution, it was adopted by the State Society, with the additional production of "formula practitionars" ditional condemnation of "female practitioners generally." At that time, so far as the "Female Medical College of Pennsylvania" was male Medical College of Pennsylvania" was concerned, there were grounds on which such a resolution was urged which now no longer exist. The Female Medical College now stands, as it has for several years, before the medical world, both in its corps of teachers and its curriculum of studies, wholly free from objections which were once adduced in support of the action of the County and State Societies.

2. This College, therefore, being organized on the same foundation as the best institutions in our country, hospital arrangements being su-perior to most of our medical schools, and possessing a distinguished medical and surgi-cal corps, let us now see the attitude of the State Society still maintained towards the Woman's Medical College, in view of its own constitution and code of ethics.

Article 2d of our Constitution says: Its objects of this Society shall be the advancement of medical knowledge; the elevation of professional character; the protection of the interests of its members; the extension of the bounds of medical science, and the promotion of all measures adapted to the relief of sufferings, and to improve the health and protect of all measures adapted to the least of protect ings, and to improve the health and protect the lives of our community."

ings, and to improve the health and protect the lives of our community."

Query.—Do not the State Society and the Philadelphia County Medical Society annul these high objects and violate the letter and spirit of their constitutions, by opposing the Woman's Medical College, as at present constituted? Is the great object of the extension of the bounds of medical science advanced by the narrow policy of repudiating, not only its worthy graduates, but all regularly educated medical women, as well as certain ominent medical gentlemen, who are equally as honest and equally as competent as ourselves in promoting the noble objects of our profession?

In regard to the qualifications of those admitted to the medical profession, our Constitution, article 4, section 2, says: "No one shall be admitted as a member of a county society unless he is either a graduate in medicine of some respectable medical school, or has a license to practice from some board

has a license to practice from some board recognized by the State Society, or has been a practitioner for at least fifteen years; and who, moreover, is in good moral and professional standing in the place where he resides and is a

standing in the place where he resides and is a regular practitioner."

Query.—What is meant by a "regular practitioner?" Article 4, section 1, of our code of ethics answers: "No one can be considered a regular practitioner or a fit associate in consultation whose practice is based on an exclusive dogma, to the rejection of the accumulate experience of the profession, and of the aid actually furnished by anatomy, physicalogy-and-organic chemistry."

ology-and-organic chemistry."
Again, the same section of the code of ethics : "A regular medical education furnishes the only presumptive evidences of professional abilities and requirements, and ought to be the only acknowledged right of an individual to the exercise and honors of his profession." The above extracts clearly define the qualification. cation which admits to membership in the profession, as well as the status entitling an individual to consultation. A non-graduate even is eligible! A physician, educated at an irregular institution, and whose practice, for fifteen consecutive years, is not based on an exclusive dogma, is eligible! We atllitate with such at this very moment; and yet the State Society and Philadelphia County Society exclude from countenance and consultation regular medical graduates of the highest culture regular medical graduaters the highest cutter foot only because they are women, but, also gentlemen of an exalted moral character, of acknowledged professional worth and skill, and alumni of the same Alma Mater with ourselves, for the sole reason that they teach in a regular Women's Hospital! This is their contradity. The unparadonable professional only guilt! The unpardonable professional sin! And although they are carrying out the very letter of our constitution in advancing medical knowledge, in elevating professional character, in extending the bounds of medical character, in extending the bounds of medical science, and in promoting all measures adapted to the relief of suffering," yet they stand accursed by the professional anathema of a resolution, which, however applicable when originally passed, has been perpetuated in the face of light and truth, by a spirit that should not exist in a liberal, humane and cientific body like the State Society.

A Senious Charge.—Upon the docket of the Supreme Court, by Counsellor Daniel Dougherty was yesterday entered an affidavit, upon which, this morning, was arrested a young man licensed as a Baptist clergyman. The complainant against him is a young woman, delicate in physique, but rich in the wealth of a noble countenance and a queenly mien. The town of Lewisburg was her home. What her affidavit represents is that the accused beguiled her into sin. She deposes that in October, 1868, she first made his acqualain October, 1808, she first made instacquation retance. In February, 1870, the accused graduated from the University. He left for Philadelphia. A correspondence, states the affidavit, was kept up between the parties. The emente was caused by the reception of a letter from him by the young lady. Its contents were to the effect that he had concluded to withdraw his promise of marriage, but that as withdraw his promise of marriage, but that as

pecuniary plaster he was ready to sup-ply whatever might be ordered. In the meantime the young lady became a mother. She is so far from friendless that Hon. Daniel Dougherty has been secured as her counsel. The accused was this morning taken into custody by a Deputy Sheriff's deputy, whose name is Getz. But that the reporters casually encountered two members of the bar, they would have been prevented from examining the dockets upon which the circumstances are recorded. But for the assistance of the professional gentlemen above named the incognito of the accused would have been

effectually preserved. The "Blessing" has chieved its eminent success by a perior. has achieved its eminent success by a persistent course of kindness and Christian char-ity. It has appealed to the Christian churches for their prayerful aid, and it has not appealed

in vain.

It is the intention of the "Blessing" to celebrate the approaching auniversary of American Independence by a public temperance meeting in Independence square, the use of the same for that purpose having been granted by the Mayor and Councils of the city. "In the matter of the application for let-ters testamentary upon the last will of Re-becca M. McMurtrie, deceased:

"And now, May 31, 1870, at a Register's Court, held this day, application is made for letters testamentary upon the last will of Rebecca M. McMurtrie, deceased, upon the Ex-ecutor taking the usual oath for the per-formance of his duties and his offering to fix United States Revenue stamps upon said let-ters testamentary, in accordance with an affi-davit of said Executor setting forth that the estate and effects for or in respect of which the said probate and letters testamentary are applied for do not exceed the sum of five usand dollars (\$5,000.)

"And it appearing that by the said will the executor has no interest, direct or indirect, in the real estate of the testatrix, it is ordered and decreed by the Court that letters testa-mentary upon said will be granted to said executor upon stamps being affixed according to the value of the estate and effects passing to or under the control of the executor.
