The force on the day line consists of two men, with a helper between Baltimore and Washington. The service differs from the night line between these two points, inasmuch as a way service is performed, although on an express train, by means of a catcher, an iron two tined fork that swings out from fastenings on the side of the car, catching the pouch in its crotch from a crane it has been hung on, as the train rushes by. There is a difference in the amount of labor between the lines on this mail in favor of day line, but the difference is diminishing.

Since the restriction of the service in the South the mails have been rapidly increasing, and to our Postoffice Department, which has provided us with such an admirable system, the public are greatly indebted.

Not one in a thousand knows anything of the small body of clerks who run these postal cars, and by whose energy and efficiency and unflagging efforts the piles of mail are distributed and despatched to their proper destination.

A great difficulty complained of by the postal car-clerks is the neglect of parties directing mail matter—and especially is this neglect attribuiable to publishers of newspapers or their mailing clerks—in not putting the name of the county in which the post-office is located, on the packages. This omission often subjects the clerks to the necessity of searching the post-office record, and thus consumes their valuable time, every moment of which is precious.—
