The medical department is under control of the medical faculty. The session for the regular lectures begins the first week in October, and ends early in March ensuing. That for the auxiliary or summer course begins the first week in April and ends the last Saturday in June!

The Jefferson Medical College was chartered
1838, and is situated in Tenth street, between
Chestnut and Walnut streets. The regular

The Philadelphia University of Medicine and Surgery was chartered 1864, and is located on Ninth street, below Locust. There are two regular sessions in each year. The first com-mences on the first Monday in October, [and ends in December; the second begins in Jan-nary and ends in March.

The Woman's Medical College, established and

chartered some 18 or 20 years ago, is located on North College avenue, west of Nineteenth on North College avenue, west of Nineteenth street. In it a regular course of medicine is taught to females by a full corps of competent professors. It is well attended, having some lifty to sixty matriculants yearly. The Degree of Doctor of Medicine is conferred on all the graduates by the Board of Trustees. Connected with this institution is the Women's Hospital

The students have the advantage of visiting all the public hospitals and clinics in the city.
