AN EXTRAORDINARY AFFAIR.

Singular Explosion in Virginia. A correspondent of the Charlottesville (Va.) ble story : •

Chronicle relates the following almost incred-ble story: • A very remarkable phenomenon occurred n this county on Tuesday last, which no one can explain. As the miller at Mr. Thomas Ayler's mill, situated on one of the tributaries of Robinson river, was sitting quictly in the mill on the evening of that day, he was sur-prised at a sudden peal, as of thunder, and on cetting up and going to the window he per-eived that his dam was blown up, and the remendous logs of which it was built were lying sixty fect in the air.
