believed for a moment that they were surrounded by the enemy. This was not the case 2but the Prussians, in great force, and well supplied with artillery, appeared on the heights of Schwergen, occupying the whole of the country, near the small Bavarian village. General Douáy ordered his troops to advance before the enemy, keeping as much as possible behind Weissenbourg, which ay just between them and the Prussian force. But this precaution proved useless, because the guns were pouring a tremendous fire upon

hem, and the troops were falling in great numbers in the village of Weissenbourg itself. The French retired from their former position, and commenced marching on the right side of the village.
