Berrible Accident .- Mr. Henry Arnold, son of Marrin Arnold, E q., of Franklintown, was killed instantly on Tuesday aftermon, about 2 o'clock, while engaged in clearing off a timber lot, on the farm of John Evans, Esq., (the old Wilson estate,) one and one fourth miles north of Dillshurg. Mr. Acnoid had cut a large oak free which in failing, fell against and lodged in a smaller one near by. He proceeded then to cut away the smaller one, though warned by his partner, Mr. Wheeler, not to do it, and whilst so doing the second tree split, from the weight of the first hearing against it, about 20 feet from the butt, the part splitting, flying loose and striking him on the back part of the head, knocking him about 20 feet distant, and producing instant death. His head was fearfully mangled, the entire back being knocked in, and the brains scattered on the ground. His corpse was immediately conveyed to his home in Franklintown. 
