An orphan in Virginia has just smoked himself to death at the age of 100

During the year 1870 the revenue collected in the 22nd district, from all sources, amounted to \$939,534.89; and in the 23rd to \$671,416. 26.

Mr. Jonathan Cass, of Deerfield, N. H. aged 90, lately went down his well, twenty feet deep, and cleaned it out; his wife, aged 91, drawing up the dirt in a bucket.

A good woman in Bucks county, Pennsylvania, is very much annoyed because, unaccountably, one of her twins, just born, proves to be a mulatto, while the other is white.

An Ohio farmer saw a stranger tearing down his rail fence, and hailed him to know the reason. The reply was that he was suddenly seized with the shakes, and was holding on to the fence for support.

A few days since at New Orleans while workmen were engaged removing large broken glass from a Canal street store, the glass fell, a piece cutting the throat of Benj. Levy, who was passing by killing him almost instantly.
