A daughter of Daniel Murphey died in Sacramento recently from taking liquid potassa, administered through the carelessness of a druggist.

Four desperate ruffians, confined in jail at Rushville, Illinois, succeeded in escaping, on Saturday night week, after a fierce assault on the jailor.

Captain F. W. Perkins, a well-known steamship agent, was found dead in his office, No. 26 Carondelet street, last week shot through the head and other evidences of violence. The coroner is investigating the affair.

Mayor Sturgis, of Meridian, Miss., was on Tuesday morning, on his own motion given a safe conduct to the cars by citizens, on a pledge to go North and never return, after tendering his resignation.
