

Arrested .- A young darkey named Chas. Green has been arrested and lodged in jail in this borough, charged with robbing the money drawer in the warehouse of Wm. Everhart, at Millerstown. The theft was committed on the 1st inst., and the arrest was made on Saturday last.

A Desperate Fellow.—On Sunday morning Calvin Morris, who is confined in jail in this borough for making a deadly assault on his uncle near Montgomery's Ferry, about three weeks ago, packed up his things and determined to start for home. He had succeeded in reaching the foot of the stairs where he met and made an attack upon Mr. Showalter the deputy Sheriff who interfered with his "flitting" arrangements. Mr. S. was compelled to use harsh measures and to call in assistance before the young chap was returned to his quarters. He is evidently a dangerous customer and should be sent where he can be properly secured and medically treated.

Outrageous .- The charges of the Express Companies for carrying small packages, are in many instances so exhorbitant as to amount to an outrageous swindle. On Saturday last, we received a package two filled. inches long and three-fourths of an inch square, by Express from New York, for which the charge was seventy cents, being three times the value of the article and five times the cost of sending it by mail. fellows who make such charges for their services in this world, don't get a pretty severe overhauling in the world to come, we can't see the use of having a place of future punishment. The best way to avoid these swindling charges is to send small and light articles by mail, and larger ones by some regular freight line, which generally has an established rate of charge which is within the bounds of reason.

Runaway Accident.-On Tuesday last, Mr. Kell, of Rye township, sent two of his boys with his horse and carriage to take Mrs. Wm. Mayall, to Marysville, where she was to take the cars for Duncannon. While descending a long hill near Mr. Ziterley's, the horse became unmanageable and ran to the foot of the hill, where, turning short, the carriage was upset, badly injuring the old, lady, though fortunately breaking no bones. She was removed to her residence in Duncannon, to which place Mr. Mayall was moving his family that day from Fishing Creek. H. Foulk, Esq., intended to have taken her to the depot, but had left home for Cumberland county before word was sent him that the family intended moving on that day, consequently Mr. Kell's boys were sent to take her down with the above unfortunate re-

Horse Thief Arrested .- On Monday, the 27th ult., a man named Nickel, hired a horse and buggy at the livery stable of H. K. Peffer, Esq., in this borough, with the avowed purpose of going to Harrisburg .-Not returning at the time specified, suspicions were aroused and search made,-On Wednesday, Constable Charles Sanno arrested Nickel at Hunter's Run, with the property in his possession. He was brought back to Carlisle and lodged in the "Sandstone Tower." He will probably be tried at the April sessions .- Carlisle Volunteer.

A Bad Case.—On last Wednesday afternoon, a fellow named Michael Eagin, who resides within a mile of Sterrett's Gap, enticed a boy not yet five years of age, a son of Hemy Sheaffer, of this borough, into the woods about half a mile back of town. After badly tearing the child's clothes and abusing the boy, the fellow laid down and went to sleep. The boy then returned home, and telling his father what had happened, went and showed him where the man was. Mr. S. then returned for help, and going back, found the man asleep, with a large dirk-knife beside him. This he attempted to use, but it was taken from him, and he was brought to town and committed to jail for twenty-four hours as a vagrant, he being badly under the influence of liquor at the time. On Thursday evening he was released, no other charge having been made, and he was started out of town .-He had got but a short distance, when some persons armed with horse whips began to hurry him along, and after chasing him a short distance other persous were found prepared to continue the chase. These were in turn relieved by other parties until the man had been run in this manner nearly half a mile.

The motive which induced Eagin to take the child, can be accounted for only on the supposition that he thought it a girl, and his treatment of him while in the woods, is evidence that such was his belief. We do not approve of lynch-law, but if anything would make a resort to it excusable, it would be the commission of such a crime as was undoubtedly intended in this case.

Lighting Railroad Cars by Gas. - The Pennsylvania Raffroad Company have been engaged for several months past in devising means and making preparation for the introduction of gas into the passenger trains on their road and its branches. The experiment proved remarkably successful and satisfactory, so far as tried, thirty-five cars having been fitted with the necessary apparatus. Additions to the number are being made as fast as possible, and it is the intention of the company to light all trains in this manner. For the purpose of supplying cars with gas, proper provision will be made at various points east and west .-A building is already in use in Pittsburg, containing six gas reservoirs connected by pipes with each other, with a large meter. These reservoirs are calculated to withstand a pressure of 400 pounds to the square inch. The gas, as it passes into the reservoirs, goes through the meter, so that an exact record of the uncondensed gas can be kept. At present the gas is obtained from the city. Preparations are being made, however, to manufacture it from crude oil, in the depot yard, which, it is thought, can be accomplished at a saving of one-fourth of the present cost, with greater illuminating power. From the condensing tanks in the building a pipe runs out, under the platform. It separates into several branches, each of these running between two of the tracks on which the waiting trains stand. At intervals, over these pipes, are trap-doors, and in the pipe, at each of these openings, is a coupling for hose. When a car is to be supplied, the trap-door nearest it is opened, a rubber hose is coupled to the pipe, and to the carreservoir, the stop-cock in the reservoir building is turned, and the car-tanks are

The apparatus attached to the cars is by no means complicated. On each side of the car under the floor, is one of the boiler reservoirs, smaller than those in the building, and into these the gas is conducted by the hose. A pipe passes from these into the car saloon, where a small meter is situated. When "lighting time" arrives the gas is turned on here. There are five burners in each car. A bracket burns in the saloon, and suspended from the roof of the car, midway between the centre and the ends, are two bronze chandaliers of two burners each, by these burners the car is so brilliantly lighted that reading is an easy matter in any part of the car, and the conductor, in collecting his ticket dispenses with his traditional lantern. Each car takes with it gas enough for sixty hours steady burning.

Similar arrangements are being made at Philadelphia, Altoona, Chicago, and other points for supplying the cars with gas in a like manner. - State Journal,
