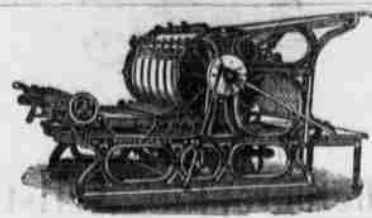

Fire in Millersburg.—On Thursday afternoon the Phining Mill belonging to Holman & Nagely at Millersburg caught fire and with the lumber in the yard adjoining was entirely consumed. It is supposed the fire originated from the boilers.

Sudden Death.—On Wednesday last a man who had taken passage on the North Central Road was taken so ill that he was left at the Liverpool station where he shortly died. An inquest was held and a verdict rendered that he had died from a cause to the jury unknown. The deceased was named G. F. Thompson and was a resident of Lancaster Pa.

Again in Trouble.—Complaint has again been made against W. T. Dewalt of Shermansdale for selling liquor to improper persons, and on Sunday. A warrant for his arrest was placed in the hands of the sheriff but probably having notice of that fact, Dewalt had left home and so far has succeeded in keeping out of the way.

A Young Kascal.—On the night of the 17th inst., a boy named Elwood Davis, who had been boarding with Mr. Josiah Wright at New Buffalo during the past winter, absconded taking with him two vests two pairs of pantaloons, an overcoat and about ninety-five dollars in money belonging to Mr. Wright and an entire suit of clothes and about five dollars in money belonging to Edward Geagan who was his room mate.

A Barn Burned.—The Huntingdon Globe says:—A barn belonging to Fredrick Heber, residing in Tod Township, this county was burned to the ground on Friday the 14th inst., consuming three head of horses two head of cattle, one buggy, a spring wagon, and all of his grain, hay and meat, involving a loss of about \$2500. There was no insurance. It is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary.

Rather Singular.—The son of a lady residing in Harrisburg, a boy of about ten years of age was attacked, about a week ago with a soreness in one of his fingers extending from the tip to between the first and second joints. After suffering nearly a week, with increasing pain, the attention of the lad was drawn to a small pustule on the end of the finger, immediately under the nail, in the center of which was seen a black spot. Further examination disclosed the presence of the half of a sewing needle imbedded in the flesh, through which it was gradually working its exit from the body. The needle was black and corroded. It is supposed that the lad unconsciously swallowed the needle when he was a child as there is no recollection in the family of any accident whereby it was run into the body. It evidently had been a long time concealed in the flesh.—State Journal.

An Interesting Case.—The following case which is reported in the Legal Gazette of the 14th inst., will be of interest to many of our readers: A stranger met Neal McCoy, of Juniata county, and brought him into a hotel of one William Young, of Millintown, where they each took a drink and then sat down, and the stranger—as Young testified—tried to sell McCoy the right to a patent hay-fork. After sitting some time, McCoy wanted more liquor, which was refused him, and he and the stranger then went out together. About this time (how, where, or when was not proved, and McCoy stated that he had no recollection of the transaction.) McCoy's signature to a promissory note for \$225 was procured. The note was payable to J. J. Wilhelm & Co., or bearer, on the 1st day of July, 1870, at the Juniata Valley bank, at Millintown, with use. Suit was brought against McCoy upon this note in the common pleas of Juniata county by the State Bank. Upon the trial Henry A. Sturgeon, Esq., cashier of the bank, was called as a witness by the plaintiff, and testified that on the 20th of June, 1870, J. J. Wilhelm & Co., called upon him to sell a number of this same kind of notes, that he thereupon consulted two or three of the directors of the bank, and they agreed to purchase the lot at the price Mr. Wilhelm asked, which was 50 cents on the dollar, and they purchased the lot offered, including the note of defendant, for \$1,462.50. Mr. Sturgeon further stated that Wilhelm said the notes were given for patent hay-forks; that the bank holds the note of one Moyer as a guaranty for the payment of these notes, in case they are not paid; that Moyer's guaranty covered only the amount paid by the bank for the notes; and that he, Mr. Sturgeon, would not have purchased the notes without a guaranty. The plaintiff's counsel contended that the circumstances under which these notes were purchased, as detailed by Mr. Sturgeon, could not in law defeat a recovery. Judge Graham submitted the question of fraud to the jury, reserving the question whether upon all the evidence, the plaintiff was entitled to recover, to be disposed of on a rule to show cause why judgment should not be entered for the plaintiff non obstante veredicto. Upon the argument of the reserved question, Judge Graham, in delivering his opinion, cited the cases in point and deduced therefrom the rule that to preclude a defence to a note fraudulently obtained, it must have been taken without notice, either actual or constructive. It must have been in the usual course of business, and not only a valuable but a full consideration paid for it. "None of the circumstances stated, says Judge Graham, exist in this case. The bank had constructive notice—circumstances of suspicion attended the transaction, sufficient to put a person of ordinary prudence and caution upon inquiry. Mr. Sturgeon was suspicious, and eminently prudent and cautious, for he purchased the note at fifty per cent. discount, and then took an indemnity from the holder for the amount paid. Nor was this transaction in the usual course of business, for I cannot suppose it is the usual course of business with the State Bank or any other bank doing business under a charter from the State, to purchase paper upon a person unknown without an endorser, at fifty per cent. discount, and take an indemnity against loss should the paper prove worthless. Again, the third requisite of the sale is wanting, to wit: that the paper be purchased for a full and valuable consideration."

His honor also discussed the quere whether a bank chartered under State law can legally purchase notes at exorbitant and usurious rates. The rate was discharged.

How Oils Explode.—In these days of "explosion" and "non-explosive oils," the following facts which are given by a correspondent in an exchange, may be useful: "The expression often used that an oil is explosive, conveys a wrong idea. The oil does not explode. An oil may even extinguish a burning match when thrust into it, and yet be highly dangerous as burning fluid. It is the vapor of these oils, mixed with the air that is dangerous, as far as explosion is concerned. Where a partly filled lamp has the portion above the oil filled with a mixture of vapor and air it may explode. When a lamp is filled while lighted, the mixture of air and vapor in the can or filler explodes upon coming in contact with the flame; the oil itself does not really explode, though it does serious injury when scattered by the explosion."

Free Dinners.—It seems that in Franklin county the system of free dinners at the Poor-house, on the occasion of the monthly meetings of the Directors, has become so annoying to the Steward and expensive to the county, as to justify the interposition of the Grand Jury. In their report last week, they call the attention of the Directors of the Poor to the evil and recommend abolition of free dinners. The Report says that many persons make it a business to be present at these monthly meetings "for no other purpose than to get a good meal at the public expense."
