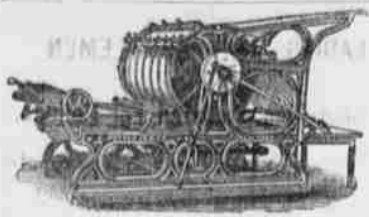

A Narrow Escape.—On Friday morning last a little child about two years old son of Mr. Andrew Comp was knocked down by a horse and had the cap of his knee badly injured by the foot of the animal. One of the other feet of the horse was placed so close on to the head of the child that some of the hair was cut off by the iron shoe.

Another Accident.—On Friday morning, Mr. Robert C. Clark, of Centre township, was injured by a horse rearing up and striking him on the head. His head was dangerously cut, and his shoulder was knocked out of joint, and for a time it was feared he was fatally hurt, but we learn that he is in a fair way to recover.

Liquor.—The bill repealing the act of 1860 which forbade the issuing of license for Duncannon has been finally passed. A bill has also been passed and signed by the Governor leaving the question of granting licenses in the twenty-third ward of Philadelphia (which is Germantown) to a vote of the people of that ward. The vote is to be taken every third year, the first vote to be taken next fall.

A Daughter of Dr. Brandt, of Mechanicsburg, Cumberland county, fell dead on Friday evening a week from excessive rope jumping. She attempted to jump 200 times probably on a wager, with the above fatal result. She had been frequently warned, and prohibited by her parents against excessive indulgence of the pastime.—Independent.

Since the above was in type we see the report of the death of the child contradicted.

The Exhibition.—The exhibition given by the young folks connected with the Presbyterian congregation of this borough, was an entire success. For two evenings, (Wednesday and Thursday,) they entertained large audiences, in a manner which gave great satisfaction. The acting was very creditable to all who took part in the performances, and the arrangement of the stage and scenery, considering the room, that could be devoted to that purpose, was very complete and showed much mechanical skill. The money that was raised is to be given to the Mite Society of that congregation. The amount cleared is about sixty-six dollars.

On Tuesday Last, two fat steers belonging to Mr. Samuel Hertzler, near Shepherds-town, were turned into the barn yard with halter chains on their necks. While playing the chains became entangled and fastened together, the efforts of the animals to extricate themselves only served to tighten and shorten the chains, and it was found that there was immediate danger of the steers being choked to death. With great presence of mind Mr. Hertzler quickly procured an axe, and in three or four blows cut of the head of one, thereby saving the one steer alive, and the other for beef. The beef when dressed weighed 800 pounds.—Independent.

Road Proceedings had at May Term, 1871.

William Wright, Esq., John Zeders and Jacob Zeigler appointed to view road from a point at or near the forks of the creek on the land of James Barkley to near John Patterson's saw mill dam, on the road leading from Montgomery's Ferry to Turpike, at John Patterson's on the Juniata river.

Samuel Liggett, William Sault and Wm. Bower, appointed to view road from Markleville to northwest end of Fourth street, in Newport.

George Beaver, Isaac Bartow and Daniel Zeigler to view proposed extension of Greenwood Street, to borough line, adjoining lands of Thomas P. Cochran's lot on road from Millerstown to Liverpool in the borough of Millerstown.

George S. Barnett, S. H. Galbraith and William Grier, to view proposed extension or continuation of High street, in Duncannon, to intersect public road near Cornelius Baskins' farm house, and the Juniata Bridge station on the Penna. Railroad.

George Hensch, Jacob Bieder and Andrew Loy to view road from near Thomas Morrow's to near William Lightner's on the Dublin Gap road, in Tyrone township.

Samuel Sheller, Irvin Chisholm and Daniel Rife, to view proposed road from the Martin house, in Allen's Cove, to Hall's mill dam, on the Bloomfield and Carlisle road, in Rye township.

John Wright, Esq., Wm. B. Leas, Esq., and John Patterson, to alter, vacate, grade, &c., from Dunkle's mill to the Union Church—to avoid the steepness of the hill at Daniel Liddick's house, in Buffalo twp.

Isaac Meek, M. B. Holman and John Detrick to view private road petitioned for by Jacob Bair, of Buffalo township.

Dr. Louis Ellerman, Jacob Shearer and Henry Binesmith, to view site for bridge across Big Buffalo creek, at cross roads near the tan yard of Rev. J. J. Hamilton, in Saville township.

The viewers appointed to view site for bridge across Fishing Creek, near Hartman's mill, in Rye township, report that it is indispensably necessary that it should be there built, and that the petitioners, or Rye township should pay \$40 toward its erection. Approved *in se.*

The report of reviewers, granting road from Gen. Wister's land to end of Bell's lane, in Penn township, is confirmed upon the damages assessed to Lewis Smith and Hugh Bell being first paid by the petitioners and other persons interested in the road, as the Court is of the opinion that the public interest will not be subserved by the opening of the road, and by the county; and no order to issue for the opening of the road until the damages be first paid. And the report of the reviewers to assess damages on said road, awarding to Hugh Bell \$109, and Lewis Smith \$41.50, is confirmed, subject to the preceding order.

Report of reviewers granting the same road as did the original viewers from Gutschall's tannery to Baltosser's foundry, in Jackson township, approved *in se.*

Report granting road from point of lands of Griffith Jones and Duncannon Iron Company, to corner of land of said Jones and B. Passmore, in Penn township, confirmed.

Report of reviewers refusing to grant road from Ickesburg to Newport confirmed.

Report of viewers granting road from E. T. Williams' tenant house, in Miller township, to M. Hartzell's barn, in Oliver township, confirmed.

Report of viewers to lay out, widen and grade the Juniata Creek road from Duncannon to Bloomfield, returning a road, approved *in se.*

Report of viewers changing location of road from near Ferguson's shop to rocks near Cool springs, to avoid three bridges, in Centre township, approved *in se.*

Hon. Joseph Bailey, James Everhart and W. S. Mitchell, to view road leading from northwest end of Cherry street in Duncannon, to intersect road on land of W. Boller, in Penn twp.

Both the reports of the viewers and reviewers on road from George McMillan's to Andrew Loy's spring house, in Madison township, was disapproved and set aside.

The report of reviewers of road from Duncannon to Marysville was continued to next term. The counsel for and against this road seem to be of the opinion that a satisfactory arrangement can be made with the P. R. R. Co., by which travelers may not be so much exposed to the dangers which threaten them at present by the railroad.

Local Briefs.

See new "time table" on the Pennsylvania railroad, which went into effect yesterday.

The salary of the borough council of Newport, last year, seems to have been \$4, which was paid in oysters at the end of the term.

Among the divorces granted by the Legislature, was the divorce of Winfield S. Dunbar, of Newport, from his wife Hannah.

Mrs. F. A. Tannelill will give one of her interesting "Parlor Entertainments," in the court house, in this borough, on Thursday evening next. Those who attend will, no doubt, have a pleasant evening.
