



A small boat, containing two men, was caught by an immense wave and dashed forward at a rapid rate of speed but fortunately both were saved. A large vessel near, reeled as in a storm, and the return wave parpartially washed over the docks, which were crowded with people, but no lives were lost.

ner" At noon on the 7th inst., a terrible accident in the Sing Sing Prison imperilled the lives of eighty-six convicts. The men were marching to the mess room for dinner, and while they were crossing over, gallery floor the structure gave way, precipitating several of the men to the pavement forty feet beneath. Others dropped to the gallery below, and sustained severe injuries. A scene of wild excitement ensued, during which numerous attempts to escape were made by the prisoners. The prison officials acted promptly and coolly, however, and in a short time extricated the victims from debris. The cause of the accident was the breaking of one of the iron braces which supported the gallery. It is feared that two of the men are fatally injured.

DEF J. M. Kimball, former owener of the abstract of Rock county, Ill., and under indictment by the grand jury for forgery, committed suicide on Monday last in his cell, by use of morphine. His life was insured for \$13,000, in favor of his wife and children. The evening prior to his death he wrote several letters ; one to the district attorney, one to the grand jury, one to his wife, and one to the woman who was the cause of his downfall

Later information has just been received, that the wife of James Kimball, the forger, who committed suicide on Monday of last week, died at Clinton, Iowa, of a broken heart. This leaves four orphen children, the eldest only nine years of age.
