

Miscellaneous News Items.

Bloomington, Ill., has induced a shoe firm to commence the manufacture of brogans in that city. They are to work fifty hands.
Hail stones recently fell out West, with insects frozen in them, which showed that animal life had been dispersing some ways up in the world.
A couple out in Portland, Oregon, who found themselves divorced lately through the machinations of the wife's mother did the best thing possible under the circumstances—promptly got married again.
A lad was seated on a rail of the Boston and Albany Road on Sunday, just as the storm came up, near Troy. The lightning struck the track some distance up, and following the rail up killed the boy.
A woman at Leavenworth, Kansas, hired a lawyer to defend her for a stipulated price, but showing some disposition to impose upon her after the trial had commenced, she dismissed him, pleaded her own case, and was discharged.
The salaries of the Postmasters throughout the country are to be readjusted on the basis of their receipts during the coming six weeks of this year, and the new schedule of salaries will go into effect July 1, 1872.
The Mayor of Philadelphia has notified the proprietors of all the concert saloons in which the dance known as the "French can-can" is performed, that it must be put a stop to immediately, or prosecutions will be at once commenced.
A sharper named Robinson has made one hundred men in Iowa believe that he discovered a mountain of gold on his way home from California some years ago, and has received \$200 from each of them in consideration of his piloting them to the place.
On Friday evening last, a little daughter of Thomas Connors, who resides near Meadville, was burned to death while attempting to kindle a fire by pouring oil from a can, upon a blaze. The can exploded, and before assistance could be rendered, she was burned into a crisp from head to foot.
Mr. J. B. Johnson, of Leeds, recently jumped from the parapet of London bridge into the Thames, a distance of thirty feet, to save a passenger who had fallen overboard from a Woolwich steamer. The rescued man offered to compensate his deliverer liberally, but he declined to receive any reward.
A woman at the poor house of Huntingdon county, located at Shirleysburg, died last week from the effects of a pin entering her ear. She had imitated the too common practice of picking that organ with a pin, and slipping from her fingers it penetrated to such a depth that efforts to extract it were unavailing.
A carriage was upset on the Plum Island road, Newburyport recently in which there were three men and three women. The dress of one of the females was caught in some part of the carriage, and before it could be detached the horse started and dragged her along. Coming on to Plumhush creek bridge, by some unknown means the girl was thrown off, fell into the water and was drowned.
A machine has been put into operation at some of the large railroad stations in Mass., that tells how long before the train starts: it reads, "This train leaves in ten minutes," then in nine, eight, etc., and when the index reaches 0, the train starts. Thus any passenger on entering a station, knows just how much time he has for getting tickets, checks, a newspaper and a seat without consulting a watch or clock to ascertain the hour of the day.
The court of appeals of Virginia has decided that drunkenness is a proper subject to be taken into consideration in determining whether a man is guilty of murder in the first degree, three requisites of which being willfulness, deliberation and premeditation, and the first case under that decision was finished in Alexandria on Friday last, the accused having murdered a little colored girl during a fit of intoxication. He was sentenced to five years' imprisonment.
A drug clerk recently put up a prescription for a young lady friend of a dose of castor oil. She innocently inquired how it could be taken without tasting it. He promised to explain to her, and in the meantime proposed to drink a glass of soda water with her. When he had finished, he said: "My friend, you have taken your oil and did not know it." The young lady was nearly crazy, and cried, "Oh dear, it wasn't for myself I wanted the oil, it was for my mother."
