177 Mr. Lodex, who lately died in Lon-don, left his relatives \$75,000,000.

"One Province in China has been visited with a terrible flood. The American minister reports that there is 10,000 square miles under water.

A terrific typhoon recently occured at Kong Kong. Three ships were dismasted and one sunk in the harbor, causing a great loss of life.

138" Advices from Odessa state that 800 buildings in the town of Bogvosloy have been burned by incendiary fires, believed to be the work of the fanatical oppressors of the Jews. The great proportion of the inhabitants of the town are of Jewish faith.

1 It is announced that the German troops now in France will evacuate six of the Departments on Nov. 17th.

IT At Constantinople the cholera, the progress of which was supposed to have been checked, is again spreading with in-creased violence. Over eighty persons have died within a few days from the epidemic. Many people are leaving the city in conse-quence of the reappearance of the plague.


