A point in assurance is brought out by the action of some Chicago merchants in moving goods to points of supposed safety where they were afterwards destroyed. The policies cover goods in a specified building only.

FOREIGN NEWS.

The English contributions for the aid of Chicago, have reached nearly \$400,000.
